Opening the Black Box

The 2019 Study conference offers exceptional Keynote speakers and will make use of Forum Theatre as a creative way of engaging with our work. It also offers the best opportunity to connect with colleagues from across the UK and explore together different ways of understanding what we do.

Deepening our understanding of the work we do is important for various reasons. Without perspective on our work we 'risk complacency, stagnation and possible complicity with that which is less than good or desirable.'¹ Alongside avoiding ineffectual or harmful practice, understanding what we do is also important for training new chaplains, the continuing education of experienced chaplains, and educating health care colleagues and the public about our work.²

Speakers / Facilitators

Daniel Grosseohme is Staff Scientist in the Rebecca D. Considine Research Institute at Akron Children's Hospital in Akron, Ohio, USA. Prior to this he was research faculty and staff chaplain at Cincinnati Children's Hospital. He is the editor of the *Journal of Health Care Chaplaincy*, and is the author of 55 peer-reviewed articles on spirituality, chaplaincy and paediatric health. In his spare time he is a first

responder (emergency medical technician) with a local fire service and plays the viola.

Steve Nolan is chaplain at Princess Alice Hospice, Esher and holds a Visiting Research Fellowship at The University of Winchester. His interests include chaplaincy case studies, practice-based research, and non-religious spiritual care. He has published books and articles on the theory and practice of chaplaincy and spiritual care. Since 2012 he has worked with Prof George Fitchett to collect chaplains' case studies which have been published as *Spiritual Care in Practice* (2015) and *Case Studies in Spiritual Care* (2018).

Dead Earnest is an Applied Theatre company based in Sheffield with a long and successful record of collaborating with organisations in the public, voluntary and community sectors. Forum theatre is a technique originally conceived by Brazilian, Augusto Boal, with the aim of giving the oppressed the chance to be heard. Dead Earnest have adapted it to enable experiential learning with the audience able to actively participate in changing what they see on stage, and in real life, for the better.
